



What Do You Want?

On the recommendation of a friend, I have just started reading a book, *You Are What You Love*, which opens with a short and apparently simple question, namely: What do you *want?* I wonder how you might respond to that question or indeed, how you did respond (in your mind or in your "gut"), when you saw the heading at the top of this page thirty seconds ago. Clearly, the question can be asked and answered in any number of different contexts and at various levels. Right now, for example, sitting at my desk in my office, the list of things I *want...* would include: another cup of coffee; a chocolate biscuit; my office to be tidier; my left eye to stop flickering; the sun to come out; and this Advertiser article to be finished before the deadline (for once)...

However, given that the author of the book, Professor James Smith, is a Christian academic, we can safely assume that he intends his question to be taken in a more challenging and non-trivial way. That is: what do you really want in life? What do you want... most? What do you want... deep-down? Of course, if we're prepared (and brave enough) to do this kind of heart-searching; and if we think we have reached the bedrock of our wants, and have succeeded in identifying our ultimate desire (X), further questions will inevitably follow. For example: Why is my heart's desire X (and not Yor Z)? Which key factors have shaped me, so that I now want X more than anything else? Is it good (or appropriate or worthy) to have X as my ultimate desire? Is X what I thought I wanted most?

In relation to these questions, Smith outlines the plot of an obscure Russian sci-fi film, called *Stalker*. The eponymous Stalker acts as a guide to two other Everyman characters, named simply Writer and Professor. "As we begin, the destination is shrouded in mystery and intrigue, but eventually we learn that Stalker is leading these men to the Zone, and more specifically to the Room within the Zone... The Room is what has drawn them here, what has led them to follow Stalker's promises. For in the Room, he tells them, they will achieve their heart's desire. In the Room, their dreams will come true. In the Room you get exactly what you want. Which is why, when they are at the threshold of the Room, Professor and Writer begin to get cold feet... because it dawns on them: What if I don't know what I want?"

Smith's subsequent challenge is very personal indeed. Given that the Room reveals everything, he asks: "...would you want to step into the Room? Are you confident that what you think you love aligns with your innermost longings?" At the start of a New Year (okay, we are already a month in, but I didn't write the Foreword for January), I wonder how many of us could answer those two questions in the affirmative; and how many of us might benefit from the insight of St. Augustine, also cited by Smith, who addressed his Creator in these words: "You have made us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

It's time to renew the Electoral Roll at St Laurence Church Appleton with Besselsleigh

The Electoral Roll is a list that every parish holds of all those entitled to vote on elections within the Church of England.

Membership on the Electoral Roll entitles a person to attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and to vote there in the elections of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and to the Deanery Synod.

If you are 16 years of age or more and live in the parish of St Laurence Appleton with Besselsleigh or you are a regular worshipper in church but live outside the parish, you can join. The roll is completely renewed every six years, at which point all members have to re-apply for membership or else their names will be deleted. 2019 is such a year.

Present Electoral Roll members will receive a form directly. The deadline for returning completed forms is 24th February 2019.

Speaker Lenthall's finest moment came when the King and troops entered the House of Commons, removed the Speaker from his chair and demanded to know from him if five knights he was determined to arrest were present in the House. Sir William replied, 'May it please your Majesty, I have neither eyes to see nor tongue to speak in this place but as the House is pleased to direct me, whose servant I am.' The thwarted King then withdrew - and no monarch since has entered

A bit of Appleton history- Hills Nursery

On 14th January I joined a gathering of family, friends, villagers and former work colleagues to celebrate the long life of Adelheid Gertrud Hill who died peacefully at her home, Rosehill, Appleton, on her 93rd Birthday, 17th December 2018.

Hills Nursery has had a long and close association with our village since Rudolph Hill came to Appleton from Germany in the mid-1930s to set up a nursery business at the upper end of Netherton Road. My husband, Jim and I moved to Appleton in 1975 to work on the nursery,

Starting in a small way Mr Hill gradually acquired more land, grew a wider selection of produce and later built a large family home. Rosehill. From the start he was a knowledgeable and passionate rose grower. After the end of WW2, while on a visit to Germany to see his family, Mr, Hill met Adelheid (better known by many as Heidi), a teacher and 21 years his junior. Her family from Essen in Germany suffered loss and hardship during the war which impacted the whole of Heidi's life. Rudolph and Heidi married in 1949 and had two sons, Randolph and Gordon, and two daughters, Doreen and Audrey. Tragically Mrs Hill outlived both her daughters, losing Audrey in 2014 and Doreen only a few months ago in September 2018.

Together Mr and Mrs Hill worked hard to create a thriving, successful nursery, producing good quality vegetables, plants and much more as well as first class roses for which they were widely known. At its peak over 100,000 roses were grown annually, buds from a large number of different varieties being grafted on to his own stock plants - a skilled and time consuming technique. For 25 years a Dutchman and his family spent several weeks every year on the

nursery ,working out in the field from early morning to dusk budding the roses. When the mature plants were in full bloom the sight of row upon row of different colour roses over a large area was stunning.

Before horticulture underwent change over the years with increasing competition and large scale production which resulted in cheaper goods becoming widely available, Hills Nursery markets were mainly local. Fresh vegetables, and also bedding plants, cut flowers, large orders of wallflower plants and more were delivered several times a week to small greengrocer shops across the Oxford area and many Appleton villagers were loyal and regular customers. Mrs Hill loved being around plants and people and could be very persuasive which was good for sales! The rose trees were distributed more widely. I have many happy memories of our time working at Hills Nursery.

In 1985 the business was sold to brothers Fred and Ron Barrett, but Mr and Mrs Hill were still involved. After Mr Hills death in 1989 Mrs Hill continued working on the nursery alongside Fred and June Barrett. When Fred retired the business returned to the ownership of the Hill family and for a couple of seasons a small bedding plant operation was run by a member of the family, after which time the nursery ceased trading.

Mrs Hill's mobility deteriorated in her latter years and she was cared for by her eldest son Randolph, until her recent death. She had 10 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren and enjoyed nothing more than having family and friends around her at home. She will be greatly missed by many and with her passing it does seem like the end of an era for those who had links with Hills Nursery.
