Dear Friends

'J S Bach – a Passion for the Cross'

Easter has inspired some of the world's finest choral music. One man who understood the powerful significance of that first Easter weekend was Johann Sebastian Bach. One of his greatest skills was to present Christian ideas through music that touches both heart and mind.

After Jesus breathed his last, the centurion watching didn't cry out, *'I'm so sorry about this, he was such a good man. Let's be quiet now as I lead us in a time of reflection and meditation.'* No! There's just been a total eclipse of the sun in the middle of the day, an earthquake, tombs split open and the temple rendered obsolete! Rather, the centurion declared, *'Surely this man was the Son of God.'*

And so if you listen to Bach's *Matthew Passion*, notice the way in which Jesus is portrayed musically – not as a weak, sorrowful figure, but as one who is sovereignly sure of where he has come from and where he is going. When the ordinary characters speak in the narrative, they are accompanied by just a keyboard. Jesus, however, is always surrounded by a 'halo' of three violins. Every time Jesus speaks, the halo is there. He is God's dearly beloved Son, the apple of his eye, his most precious treasure, absolutely pure, perfectly holy, the image of God himself.

But then listen to Jesus as he hangs on the cross, the burden of the world's sin on his shoulders. He is drinking the cup of God's wrath as our substitute. When he cries, *'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?'* listen for the halo of violins. You will notice that the violins have gone. He becomes just like an ordinary person, bearing the full weight of each of our rebellion. God's dearly loved Son, the apple of his eye, forsaken for us.

Bach knew and wanted us to understand that Jesus fully paid the price of our rejection of the Creator. Jesus was taking our place, the perfect Lamb becoming like sinful man so that we could be restored into God's loving arms. The point of Good Friday is that we recall the good news that we can be rescued from God-forsakenness, and can have the full weight of our sin emptied onto Christ. Bach wasn't just writing beautiful music. He was communicating the greatest message the world has ever known and could ever know.

We are very much hoping that St Laurence will be open in good time for the Easter weekend and services on Good Friday (2nd April) at 10am and Easter Sunday (4th April) at 8am and 10am. More details to follow in the April 'Advertiser'.

You may have come across him wandering happily about the woods armed with a butterfly net! Ryan's particular area of interest is flies and he has kindly agreed to come to talk to us about what he has seen and learnt about Besselsleigh Woods. His most exciting find was the sphaeroceridae fly *Minillimosina Secundaria* which was thought to be extinct in Britain having not been recorded since 1909, and is very rare in Europe. Ryan is one of life's enthusiasts and this promises to be a very enjoyable evening.

FLOOD PROTECTION IN APPLETON WITH EATON

Many villagers will remember the floods in 2007 when over 40 properties were significantly affected. Following this, the main problem areas were identified, remedial drainage works carried out, water courses, ditches and drains were cleared, structural work undertaken to replace pipes and culverts. The risk to these properties is much lower. However, one or two areas remain susceptible to flooding on the roads after exceptionally long periods of heavy rain. As everyone knows this is most likely when the ground water levels are already high but can also follow prolonged dry spells when the ground is too hard to absorb sudden downpours.

Villagers are reminded that Appleton has a store of equipment available for use in an emergency:

Two petrol pumps, two submersible pumps, three 100m reels of hose, one Aqua vac for shallow water on carpets and a supply of Aquasacs. These sacs are dry storage flat packs, which swell in contact with water to form an effective barrier acting in a similar way to sandbags. They take up little room, are easy to handle and are available to all householders who are aware of flood risk to their properties. It is also important to remind villagers that everyone whose property borders a water course or ditch is responsible for keeping it clear. Where ditches have been filled in this adds to the problem. It also helps to report any blocked drains to the Parish Council. Where there is a flooded road PLEASE drive slowly to avoid forcing water into adjacent properties or endangering the public.

If you need help in an emergency or advice on protecting your property, please contact any of the volunteer flood wardens listed below. All live in Appleton, have access to the equipment and know who can operate the pumps.

Gardening Club



In February we had a very interesting talk by Ruth Madder who is the Director of Bridewell Gardens in West Oxfordshire. The talk was on the social and therapeutic benefits of gardening and the work undertaken at Brideswell. The charity provides a mental health recovery service using the gardens to support people with severe mental health problems. People usually come to the gardens for 1 or 2 days each week for between 6 months and 2 years and are referred by Oxfordshire Mental health Services.

The gardens consist of a walled garden with a forge and a vineyard and the staff are helped in their work by a group of volunteers. There is a schedule of work for the day and people are encouraged to help wherever they wish, with encouragement to try new activities – the kind of work includes gardening, landscaping, blacksmithing, cooking with the produce grown in the garden, woodwork, willow weaving and land-based crafts. The vineyard was planted 20 years ago and is certified organic. Everyone helps with the harvest and the grapes go to a winemaker in Kent to produce a sparkling white wine. The wine is sold at Open Days and other local outlets including Burford Garden Centre and the income provided helps to cover some of the costs of running the centre.

Due to Covid19 this year has been difficult but every effort has been to offer support to the people using the garden for therapeutic purposes. A small team of staff and volunteers have been maintaining the gardens so that they continue to be available to continue their important work in the future. As spring approaches the talk also reminded us of the value of our own outdoor spaces.

Our next lecture is on 10th March at 7.30 pm, via Zoom when Jackie Bennett will talk on

Island Gardens – Journeys around the British Isles. Jackie is the author of several books on British gardens and in this illustrated talk she will refer to her 2018 book on Island Gardens. Next steps

After the publicity period ends, we will send your response to an independent examiner to consider. As the neighbourhood planning process includes an independent examination of the plan, your name, postal address and email address (where applicable) are required for your comments to be considered by the examiner. The opportunity for further comments at this stage would only be at the specific request of the examiner.

Most neighbourhood plans are examined without the need for a public hearing. If you think the neighbourhood plan requires a public hearing, you can state this in your comments, but the

examiner will make the final decision.

Please clearly state in your comments if you wish to be notified of our decision on whether we formally adopt the neighbourhood plan.

As Chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group I would like to say thank you to everyone who has since 2016 contributed to the plan. Without you we would not have a plan. It's been a longer process than first anticipated but I hope you agree it will have been worth it. Please take the opportunity to make comments during the consultation details above.

State of Footpaths

As you may have noticed in walking around the village, many of the footpaths are extremely muddy, making them quite hazardous. As you can imagine, this is due to the wet weather and the number of walkers during lockdown.
