
## Appendix I Consultation Results from Drop-in Session 27 January 2018 Draft Neighbourhood Plan

3. Village Facilities		
<ul> <li>Village facilities are highly valued and want to be protected</li> <li>There is no apparent assessment as to whether any of the existing facilities are vulnerable to being lost and if they are vulnerable than what needs to happen to ensure their survival</li> <li>Some facilities such as the primary school and tennis club require a large number of people from outside the neighbourhood plan area to ensure their survival. The flood lights at the tennis court ensure all year-round use</li> </ul>	• Comments noted.	None required.

- In recent years only about 1/3 of annual intake of new children attending the primary school are from within the Neighbourhood plan catchment area
- If Appleton with Eaton want these to continue then they either have to facilitate the ownership of properties within the Neighbourhood plan catchment area which have children of primary school age or accept the problems of cars bringing children from outside the neighbourhood plan area.
- Facilities need to be used and if the demographic of a community changes then some facilities will become redundant or non-viable such as the now lack of a regular bus service or the demise of 2 pubs (3 Horse shoes and the Thatched Tavern)
- If a village facility is always in use for a certain period of time – i.e. village hall Mondays to Thursday during term time by pre-school this prevents / restricts other groups or organisations developing as they have nowhere to meet.

<ul> <li>I do not recall seeing a specific policy regarding the village shop</li> <li>How vulnerable is the shop to being lost?</li> <li>Takings in the village shop as reported in the advertiser has slowly been decreasing over the last few years.
