Dear Friends

"And ultimately, it's my life." Those words were spoken on a recent radio debate about euthanasia. The contributor was seeking to justify his right to choose the time and manner of his death. But the debate could just have easily have been about abortion, or the redefinition of marriage, or a host of other current moral 'hot potatoes', for his statement sums up the philosophy of secular humanism that is coming to dominate our culture. In the absence of faith in God, the only compass left for my choices is my own wants and desires. Indeed, the rejection of God is often explicitly commended as the prerequisite for moral and emotional maturity – the ability to stand on my own two feet and make my own decisions. To believe in God is to forfeit my freedom.

Of course, even a moment's thought reveals significant flaws with this creed. For a start it is simply not true. All of us live in a network of relationships that means that I can never act alone without impacting the lives of others. The husband who abandons his wife and children may try to justify his actions with the claims "It's my life", but most onlookers (not to mention his wife and children) would condemn it as utterly selfish. Likewise, the teenager who ruins a family holiday by only considering his own wants is rightly regarded as immature. The fact is that humans are fundamentally relational beings, rather than autonomous individuals.

Which explains why 'it's-my-life-ism' is also an unliveable philosophy. If I try to retain exclusive possession of my life, I will shy away from all relationships that might tie down and make me committed or indebted to others. I will end up lonely, isolated and self-absorbed, which sadly describes the lives of a growing number of people in our culture: they are busy, successful, rich in possessions and experiences, but they have no-one with whom to share these things.

But the ultimate tragedy of this belief in human independence is that it places an unbearable weight on the individual to take sole responsibility for their happiness. My present well-being, not to mention my eternal joy, rests on me and my choices. If I am unhappy, I have no-one to blame by myself and no-one to rescue me but myself. No wonder it's a short step to demanding the 'right to die'.

What a relief, then, for the Christian to hear the words Paul wrote to the church in Corinth: 'You are not your own; you were bought with a price.' By creation I belong to God, but in my sin I have rejected his loving ownership. Yet God loved me so much that he was willing to buy me back as his possession at the infinite cost of his own blood. My eternal security and happiness rest no longer on me and my efforts but on him and his past work of redemption. To the ears of those who place independence above all else, this language of belonging sounds like slavery but, as the Christian discovers, it is perfect freedom. It is only as more see through the lies of our culture, that they will discover the joy and security that comes from belonging to Christ.

Our March meeting will be on Thursday, March 16th at 2pm in the Village Hall.



Gardening Club





Andrew first looked at the flowers quoted from Shakespeare's plays and told us which plants Shakespeare may have been referring to – for instance a gillyflower might be either a carnation or stock, both of which were grown at the time, and woodbine could be any climbing plant. Popular plants at the time were pansies, often referred to as Cupid's flower, lilies, lily iris and crown imperials amongst others. Medicinal plants were also grown some of which had been brought back by the Crusaders. Knowledge of herbal plants was passed from woman to woman who gained a reputation of being witches.

Andrew then talked about Kenilworth Castle where the Elizabethan Garden has been recreated using plants which would have been available at the time. The castle was gifted to Robert Dudley in 1563 and when Elizabeth 1 was to visit the castle he planted up a garden especially for her. It is thought he might have planted beds full of pansies. This garden is laid out following the design of Islamic Gardens – rectangular area divided into four with paths between each bed a fountain in the centre, an aviary and two arbours planted with honeysuckles.

At our next meeting we will have a talk by Rosy Hardy on Spring Flowering Perennials. Rosy founded and runs Hardy's Cottage Garden Plants in Whitchurch, Hampshire which specialises in herbaceous perennials. She will be bringing a selection of plants for sale. The meeting will be held on Wednesday, 8th March at 7.30 pm in the School Hall. Visitors are always welcome to join us and there is a small charge of £2.

Exciting news – we own our own freehold premises!

The Board are delighted to report that the freehold of the Village Shop is now owned by Appleton Community Shop Limited.

In the days when the shop was privately owned the owners of Rowan Cottage (the thatched cottage behind the shop) also owned and ran the Shop. When, in 2000, the then owners decided that they could no longer run a shop, a group of villagers got together and set up the Community Shop and for the last 22 or so years the Shop has been paying rent to its Landlord.

A while ago, the opportunity presented itself for us to buy the freehold of the Shop and, after careful consideration, the Directors agreed that it would be a good thing to do as it both secures the asset for the village in perpetuity and, although there will still be constraints on the space available and what can be done with it, it will allow us to develop the business as we would want. The Directors approached our volunteer base and were delighted and impressed with the number of people who stepped straight up and offered to support the purchase with long term and generous loans. We were able to raise the money to buy the freehold outright.

Thank you, thank you to those generous lenders who, together with the Shop's Board of Directors, have enabled us to ensure that the Shop's freehold premises are now in Village ownership.

Not having to pay rent is a bonus and a welcome one especially at a time when we are having to work hard to keep our other costs manageable. We use a large amount of expensive electricity to keep the chillers and freezers going and all other costs continue to increase as well. Never has the word Community been so important to the Shop. Without our remarkable and flexible team of volunteers Appleton would not have a shop. The support provided by Volunteers and the Board to the management team means that the Shop remains open for a remarkable 64 hours week after week! You only have to be working there at 7 am when families have a 'breakfast crisis', at 5.59 pm when there is no supper in the house or, best of all, Christmas Eve when the sellotape has run out, to know how valued the Shop is in the Village.

With our huge thanks for the ready willingness of so many to support our Village Shop, in this case in particular to those who have supported us in buying the Free-hold.

Long may Appleton Community Shop continue! The Directors

Appleton History & Health – Viruses

We have seen a lot of viruses and vaccinations in the last three years - but such experiences are not new. 245 years ago a Dr Hall was practising inoculation in Appleton against a much-feared virus – smallpox. He used a dwelling called Waters Furze - about a quarter of a mile upstream from the end of Badswell Lane.

Here he practiced smallpox inoculation. He took a piece of smallpox scab or pus from

an infected person and scratched into the skin of his patient. A smallpox infection would ensue – but only about 1% would die – compared to as much as 25% in an epidemic. The patient would remain at Waters Furze for up to a month – looked after by a nurse. Dr Hall's fee was a guinea and a half plus five shillings for the nurse – all in about 37s (£1.85) - equal to six weeks of a labourer's wages; clearly only for the well off.

Some 20 years later a new method - vaccination - was created – an invention that has probably saved more lives than any other.

'As Mad as a March Hare'

This phrase has been around since the 16th century, just like 'hare brained'. I'm referring to the brown hare, Britain's fastest wild mammal. They can reach speeds of up to 45 mph and outrun most pursuers, outwitting them by running in a zig-zag, swerving fashion. The 'mad March boxing' is usually a female 'jill' fending off the attentions of a male 'jack', standing on their hind legs and literally boxing, either to show that she



is not yet ready to mate or as a test of his determination. Spring is their main mating season although breeding can take place between February and September with as many as three or four litters of two to four young. Baby hares are known as leverets. They're born fully furred and eyes open so that they are ready to run from predators if need be. Lifespan is 3 to 4 years and is a solitary one entirely above ground (unlike rabbits) sleeping and breeding in shallow depressions known as forms. Hares are nearly twice the size of rabbits with longer black tipped ears, orange eyes, reddish brown fur and powerful hind legs. Hares are herbivores; their favourite food is grass but they will also eat flowers, seeds, vegetables and fruits. Typically hares can be seen bounding across fields, so grab some binoculars and head out ring side, I mean field side, and you might just see a good fight!

Did you hear about that bald guy down Netherton Road that got rabbits tattooed onto his head? From a distance they looked like hares.

Oh yes, and on a warm March day 'keep 'em peeled' for a buttery yellow brimstone.

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
