## The Season of Allhallowtide

Did you know that Halloween is called Hallowe'en because it is the Eve of All Hallows' or All Saints' Day and did you know that it is part of the three days known as Allhallowtide?

31<sup>st</sup> October All Hallows' Eve 1<sup>st</sup> November All Hallows' or All Saints' Day

2<sup>nd</sup> November All Souls' Day

## Halloween

The current English name *Halloween* traces back to medieval Christianity. The word *hallow* is derived from the Middle and Old English words for holy. As a noun, it can also mean *saint*. In those days, the Christian holiday we know as All Saints' Day was called All Hallows' Day, and the day before, when an evening mass was held, was All Hallows' Eve. That name eventually got shortened to Halloween.

## All Saints' Day means ALL Saints' Day

Canonised saints have individual feast days so All Saints' Day recognizes those saints only known to God. The date of All Saints' Day differed from country to country and from denomination to denomination and it wasn't until the 9<sup>th</sup> Century that Pope Gregory VI standardised the date to 1<sup>st</sup> November.

## All Souls' Day

Makes up the third day of Allhallowtide and is the day for commemoration of all the faithful departed. Historically for those baptised Christians who were believed to be in purgatory (thought to be a place of suffering inhabited by the souls of sinners who were being purified of their sins before going to heaven).

## ALL Saints' Day at St Laurence – 1<sup>st</sup> November 4pm

In St Laurence we are meeting together (or maybe will have met together by the time you read this) at 4pm for tea and fellowship to remember in friendship all those dear to us who are no longer here with us. 

## **My Appleton Apple Tree – Part 2**

So now, let's delve back in time to the beginning of the twentieth century when my wonderful and sorely missed Grandmother Riley was born near Spinkhill in Derbyshire. Grandmother came into this world as one of the younger members of a tribe of eighteen brothers and sisters, all of whom were adored equally by their parents. Sadly, some of my grandmother's siblings did not survive into adulthood.



This loving family was not wealthy. Life was hard for them. Everyone had to muck in and help, with the older siblings being willingly dispatched to work to keep the family afloat. They lived in a crumbling, disused windmill which had ivy and all manner of foliage circling around its circular walls. It was minus its sails. The windmill sat in the centre of a field where proudly stood several Bramley apple trees.

These trees stood the family in good stead. Each autumn, hordes of local children were sent to the Riley's family windmill to buy apples. Money was scarce so very little was charged for the apples.

Young girls wore pinnies in those days to protect their well-

worn dresses. So on arrival at the windmill they would ask for a half-penny's worth of apples. Grandmother Riley always used to say "Hold up your pinny and close your eyes". Needless to say, they went away with more than one pinny could hold!



#### What did the Romans do for us? They had a river crossing

If you were taking goods to market in Roman Oxford in 946, or bringing precious metals upriver to your Saxon lords a century later, or if you were a 13<sup>th</sup> century monk travelling between the Benedictine abbeys in Eynsham and Abingdon, you were able to cross the Thames at Bablock Hythe.

The exciting news is that the County Council is actively considering a new footbridge there, to reinstate this centuries-old river crossing. This is part of the Strategic Active Travel Network.

This would be fantastic for local residents in widening the walking and cycling opportunities. Imagine if you have just bought an e-bike, or you have a young child who has just learnt to ride a bike and you are looking for quiet roads for a ride. With a bridge at Bablock Hythe, a whole network of lanes and villages becomes accessible. Playground? Check (Standlake, Stanton Harcourt). Pub? Check (The Harcourt Arms, The Red Lion, The Black Horse....) Afternoon tea? Check (Eynsham, Aston Pottery). Or maybe your teenager wants to spread their wings and go to sixth form in Eynsham, which would be easily reached by bike or e-bike. There would be better access to local footpaths, and we could connect much more with communities on the other side of the river. Some of those villages must have Aunt Sally teams...

## Hooters

Settle down chaps, I know The Plough has just reopened (or is about to at the time of writing) but it won't be that sort of hostelry or will it? This month, great tits... sorry I mean owls.

There are five resident owl species found in the British Isles, four of which are native (barn, tawny, long-eared and short -eared) and one (little) was introduced in the 1800s. Did you know that not all owls hoot? In fact, the characteristic 'twit-twoo' can be attributed to just one British owl species; the tawny. The females do a sharp 'ke-wick' while the males make a wobbly 'hoo-hoo.' I quite often hear tawnys in the Manor grounds opposite me. Just the other night I heard this owl hooting a lot. I thought, that's got a bad case of irritable owl syndrome.

My personal favourite and the one I love to see especially in flight is the barn owl (pictured) They are often seen hunting at dusk and dawn, quartering along linear features like hedgerows, although they can sometimes be seen in the daytime during the winter months when food supplies are low.

Have you ever found an owl pellet? These consist of the parts of the prey that owls can't digest, such as fur, bones, teeth and feathers. Owls swallow their prey whole and the pellets are regurgitated later. Besides the remains of small mammals, which are the most frequent prey, pellets can contain remains of birds, bats, amphibians, insects and earthworms.

Last month we had a clutter of spiders.



Well, a group of owls is called a parliament, wisdom, or study, and baby owls are known as owlets.

As the days begin to grow shorter, the council would like to remind people who are walking at night to please carry a torch and wear reflective clothing. This is for everyone's safety.



## Appleton History – the colour blue

In doing some DIY at home a flake of paint came clean off some bedroom woodwork. As the room is about 200 years old I wondered if this flake held a record of the room's paintwork. I cut the flake across with a fine blade and put it under a microscope. I could just about make out 17 layers of paint – so the average age of a layer was 12 years. The youngest paints were mostly bright whites – the oldest were very thin pale browns, yellows and greens.

But there was a dramatic thick layer of BLUE paint – about seventh up – maybe late 1800s; then a second very similar layer eleventh up – early 1900s?



Blue paint pigment had been known for millennia – but it was very rare and expensive - equal in cost to gold. It was mined secretly in north-eastern Afghanistan and traded its way to Europe; it was known as Ultramarine – meaning "from beyond the sea".

In the 1820s artificial blue pigments were created in France and Germany. Blue paint very slowly became available as house paints. On this evidence a blue paint had arrived in Appleton by the late 1800s at the latest.

Before the 1820s Ultramarine use was limited to churches and prosperous artists; if an artist had a commission that needed blue they would have to charge a great deal to buy the pigment. In the painting "Girl with a Pearl Earring" c1665 the girl wears a blue headband of Ultramarine that cost Vermeer a small fortune.

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
