Epiphany

Most people today recognise January 6th as the twelfth day after Christmas, when traditionally we take down the Christmas decorations. But it is also the Christian Feast of Epiphany. Epiphany is one of the earliest Christian festivals and pre-dates Christmas, which wasn't established as a separate time to celebrate Jesus' birth until the end of the 4th century.

Epiphany means "appearance" or "manifestation". At Christmas we celebrate the birth of Jesus, when God came to be with us as one of us, as a human baby. At his birth, he was visited by local shepherds, symbolising that he came for God's original chosen people, the Jews. At Epiphany, we celebrate that in the birth of Jesus, God also came for the Gentiles (non-Jews), represented by the visit to the child Jesus of the mysterious Wise Men, Magi or Kings from the East.

Epiphany is then a time of revelation. Through the birth of Jesus, God reveals himself to both Jews and Gentiles – to all humanity; to all peoples, regardless of race or religion. And the visits of the lowly shepherds and of the wise men bringing their expensive gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh symbolises that God comes to us for all people, regardless of wealth or position.

God doesn't have favourites. He freely and unconditionally offers his pure, saving love to every one of us: a gift of 'good news' for all. How will we respond to this offer?

If you would like to hear more about the love of God revealed to us in Jesus, why not join us for the All-Age Epiphany service at St Laurence Church, 10.00am on Sunday 7th January. Coffee and pastries will be served from 9.45.

RAINFALL IN APPLETON IN 2023 (up to Dec.10th)

It has been a soggy year. But how wet? At 96.8cms (38ins) that's the wettest for at least 13 years, and well above the annual average for Oxford, which is around 63.5cms (25ins). March was the wettest month with 15.5cms (6ins) followed closely by October, 15.2cms (6ins). In contrast, February, traditionally a month of rain and snow, managed a mere 1cm. There were fine spells lasting three weeks in May and June, and odd dry weeks in September and October, but otherwise it has been a good year for umbrella sales. It is not a proper winter without snow, and Appleton had just enough of the white stuff to cover the ground on two occasions, but it did not lie. Our heat waves were similarly short-lived.

Parish Councils demystified!

This month's information about parish councils is on rights of way. 'Public Rights of Way' is the term for footpaths (for walkers only), bridleways (for walkers, horse riders

and cyclists), restricted byways (for walkers, horse riders, cyclists and horse-drawn carriages) and byways (for walkers, horse riders, cyclists, horse-drawn carriages and motor vehicles). Due to the budget constraints and lack of resources, the Countryside Access team encourages parish councils to keep an eye on local public rights of way.

Appleton with Eaton Parish Council had a very positive meeting with landowners and the Countryside Access team in 2023. Following that meeting, Richard Prickett has become a Parish Path Warden through Oxfordshire Area Ramblers. There are 2 other local residents who are working with the Parish Council to walk footpaths and make the Council aware of any obstructions or other issues.

Parish Path Wardens keep an eye on local public rights of way, reporting issues noticed to the Countryside Access team. Stiles and gates are the responsibility of the landowner. Bridges are the responsibility of the County Council.

If you do come across any issues with regards to rights of way, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Resistance to the Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme (OFAS) continues

The Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme is being proposed by the Environment Agency (EA) to reduce flooding of the River Thames, particularly in the Botley and Abingdon Rd areas. They aim to introduce new wetland habitat to the west of Oxford as well as reducing flood risk.

The EA are attempting to progress nearly 1,000 Compulsory Purchase Orders. However, opponents of OFAS claim that they have failed to ensure that those affected have been given enough time to respond. They also say that the way that the orders have been publicised is “not fit for purpose” and want the Environment Secretary to order the Notice Period be re-started in the new year, using more diverse methods used to engage all members of the electorate. Social media must be used, they claim, if all the electorate are to be engaged in democracy.

The Ferry Hinksey Trust and the Oxford Flood Environment Group are trying to save Hinksey Meadow, They say that the EA is expected to provide land comparable to that purchased, in compensation. Most of the land that the EA has suggested, however, is already public land, and so there is a “net loss to the public realm”.

Christmas detox ...

Now we are into the New Year, balance the rich diet of the holidays by taking advantage of our more healthy options. Watch your waistline with plenty of fruit (satsumas, pears, apples ...) and vegetables (cabbage, squash, carrots ...). Cook high protein meals with our fresh meats, or our frozen fish and plant-based selections.



Or if that all feels a bit much after the hectic holidays, settle down with one of our fantastic frozen meal selections – lasagne, stuffed pancakes, fish pie and other winter warmers.

Friday night supper club

Mushroom gratin

This looks impressive, but is pretty easy!

Ingredients: mushrooms : onion : garlic (c.2 cloves) : white sauce (butter, flour and milk – or cheat with a mushroom soup) : herbs : breadcrumbs : cheese

1. heat oven to 180°C or 160 fan
2. Clean the mushrooms, cut large ones into half add to a deepish oven proof dish.
3. Finely chop onion and garlic and fry until clear and soft. Add to mushrooms
4. Either pour over the mushroom soup, or make a white sauce (the consistency of single cream – lots of guides on the internet), add herbs (?oregano) , salt and pepper and pour over mushrooms.
5. Sprinkle the breadcrumbs and grated cheese over the top
6. Bake for 30-40 mins and eat with lots of Cornfield bread.

The only other sound's the sweep

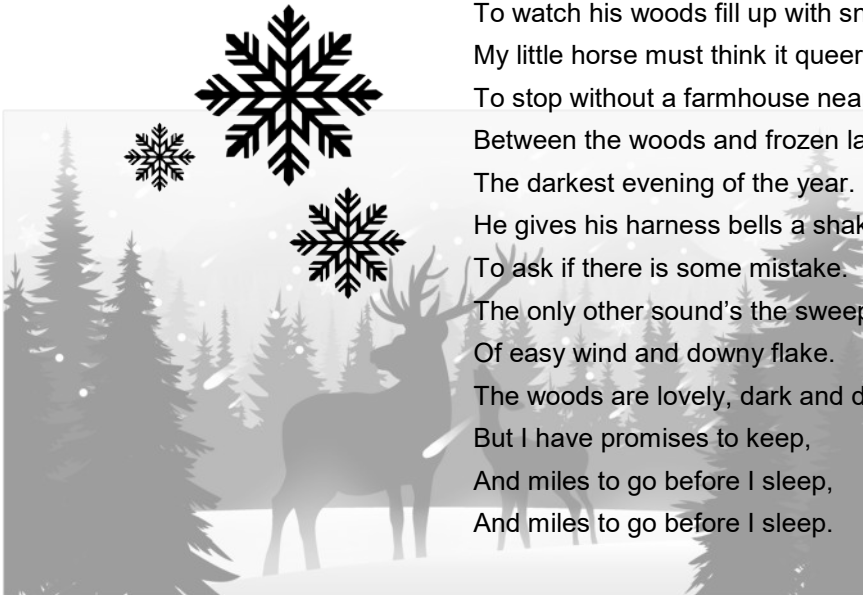
Of easy wind and downy flake.

High Sheriff's Awards



Applications are invited for nominations for the High Sheriff's Awards for the year 2023/2024

Every year the High Sheriff of Oxfordshire invites nominations for approximately 20 High Sheriff Awards in recognition of individuals in Oxfordshire who have made outstanding contributions to the communities in which they live and work. Nominees will usually have had a high impact on the lives of others over a sustained period of time and will be recognised by other people working in the nominee's area as inspirational and as setting an example for others to follow.

High Sheriff's Awards will not normally be made to people whose work and commitment has already been recognised by the award of a National Honour or by bodies such as the Police, the Fire and Rescue Service and Oxfordshire Charity and Voluntary Action.

Nominations can be made by anyone who lives or works in Oxfordshire or who is representing an organisation in the public, voluntary and charitable or private sectors. All nominations will be treated in the strictest confidence and nominees should not be informed that they have been nominated as it can be very disappointing to raise expectations which are then not met.

The Nomination Process

All nominations should be made on the downloadable form which has been prepared for this purpose and should include the contact details of the nominee as well as the nominator together with a brief summary (400 words max) of the reasons why the nominee merits a High Sheriff's Award.

The deadline for nominations is Friday 5th January 2024. Successful nominees will be contacted early February and the High Sheriff Awards will be conferred at a ceremony in central Oxford on a date to be confirmed to which nominators, families and friends will also be invited.

Nominations should arrive with the High Sheriff BY 5th JANUARY 2024 and sent via email to oxfordshire@highsheriffs.com or by post to Mrs Sally Scott, High Sheriff of Oxfordshire, The Limes, Shenington, OX15 6NH.
