

#### **ORDINARY?**

One of my favourite bible passages is the Wedding at Cana from St John, chapter 2. It's what I preached at my last service as a Rector in Somerset. It's also what I spoke about at the interview leading to my new post as Associate Archdeacon of Dorchester.

At its heart is Jesus' first miracle in the Gospel when he turned water into wine and saved a wedding celebration. At its heart is a miracle of something ordinary being turned into something extraordinary. That's what I love about it. To me is speaks of the most profound gift of God to us, God's people: his promise to always be with us and, that with God, our ordinary everyday lives can be extraordinary. We can experience the fullness of life that Jesus came to show us.

I did a straw poll recently and asked people what came to their minds when they heard the word 'ordinary'. The responses were mixed. Some were positive, some were negative: safe, consistent, traditional, boring, staid, normal, relaxed, timely, mundane, stifling, stable. Some people commented honestly that their view of 'ordinary' changed with their age or circumstances.

Perhaps there is something in that. I am also a fan of St Benedict who taught about the values of obedience, stability and conversion of life. By this he encouraged his monks to stay in the monastery but to pray for conversion of life while they stayed put. By this he meant that there was always more to learn and experience with the life of faith. To me this brings home how we can experience God and a life of faith in our ordinary lives. That we can experience the extraordinary in our everyday lives if we continue to listen to God (and listen is the root of the word obedience that Benedict uses). We may not live in monasteries or follow such a structured rhythm of life but yet there is deep wisdom for life here.

This brings me back to the Wedding at Cana and one of my favourite parts of the story which is the servants filling the water pots. They do this day in day out, doing as they are asked. It's an ordinary task, an everyday task, but it's necessary in order for the miraculous to happen. If they didn't do it there would be no water to turn into wine. It's the servant's faithfulness in doing the ordinary things that enables Jesus to turn the water into wine. It's this that blesses the wedding couple and all their guests.

So here we are travelling thought Lent. We may well be living ordinary lives but this season invites us to continue to listen to God, to do the ordinary things and know they are of value, to know that God can use them to do miracles that will

bless people. We are invited to reflect on the full life which is the promise of God to us. We do this as a way of preparing ourselves for the greatest miracle of all that we celebrate at Easter: the resurrection of Jesus. We will celebrate not just Jesus' resurrection but God's promise also to us that, with God, our ordinary lives can be extraordinary and that, at their end, we too will know the power of resurrection.

# **News from the Appleton with Eaton Parish Council**

#### **Precept**

As you may be aware, the Precept is a tax, included within the local Council Tax, which enables the Parish Council to perform its functions.

The Parish Council is required (in law) to agree a budget before it can set its Precept and both must be agreed by the full Parish Council.

Once the Parish Council has forecast its budget requirements for the following financial year, it requests this funding from its 'local billing authority' – in our case, the Vale of White Horse District Council (VoWHDC)) – in the form of the Precept.

VoWHDC then converts the Precept into an amount per Council Tax payer that is added to the Council Tax bill (according to the property band) for all the dwellings within the Parish area.

At the Parish Council meeting of the 11<sup>th</sup> December, the Council resolved the following for the 2024//2025 financial year:

Projected expenditure: £37,385.00

Projected Income: £6,064.00

Precept of £32,000

This precept will yield a 4.9% increase from 2023/2024.

The budget is on the Parish Council website. If you have any questions as to the budget, please feel free to contact the Clerk.



# Appleton History – Our Travelling Fair

Out of the blue I got an email alert from the USA – about a new book. The book was about a circus – of no obvious interest to me. But - I had a peep and one word jumped out at me; the word was Pratley.

This reminded me of the two cottages – long gone – that stood on the corner of Eaton Road and Badswell Lane - now a plain grass verge; the photograph is a view from Church Lane sometime before 1940; the Pratleys lived on the right - the Skeats next-door.

David Slattery-

Christy – a well-known playwright – wrote the book I was alerted about. His grandfather was Walter Pratley (1895-1939) born in the family cottage; as a youngster Walter was entranced by the Travellers who passed through Appleton and who set up fairs in the village and further away in Abingdon and Oxford. Despite the



efforts of his family and the local police Walter eventually ran away and joined the fairground families.

He was in his element – building his own fair – including a Galloping Horses ride and eventually becoming a Master Showman. He travelled the country with his fair from Cambridge to Pembroke and most places between. His son Reginald continued the family business.

The author told me that his Appleton family was fairly chaotic and putting it altogether was hard work. The Pratley families have now left Appleton and are mostly found in Witney and Chipping Norton.



# Oxford's Flood Alleviation Scheme Could be Referred To The National Audit Office

Oxford's proposed Flood Alleviation Scheme (OFAS), designed by the Environment Agency (EA), could be the subject of a National Audit Office (NAO) investigation. Local campaigners have written to the NAO and claimed that £70 million could be saved from the project's £176-million budget.

They claim that the money saved could be better used in providing new flood alleviation schemes in Abingdon, Wallingford and Reading, after recent bad weather showed that these areas are vulnerable to flooding, which could cause damage to local residents and businesses.

The OFAS has used nearly 1,000 Compulsory Purchase Orders (CPO). The campaigners claim these were illegal as viable alternatives exist. The Enquiry Inspector is due to send her report to the Environment Secretary shortly, and Steve Barclay MP will announce his decision in the Spring. However, with growing opposition to the EA's plans, the National Audit Office should now investigate how the EA is about to use public funds.

# Cost of living support

We have a new scheme to support residents who are either in, or at risk of being in



crisis and have no other source of financial support available to them. The Oxfordshire Residents Support Scheme will help with short-term basic living costs such as food and credit for gas or electric prepayment meters. In most instances, cash will not be awarded, but a pay point voucher (which can be redeemed for cash) or bank transfer can be supplied where necessary.

The support is available to all Oxfordshire adult residents aged 16 years plus who have families with young children, have long-term illness, mental health needs or disabilities.

Homes with older people, pregnant residents or people at risk of domestic abuse are also eligible.

Early years childcare



Starting in April this year, existing childcare support is being expanded. From 1 April 2024, eligible working parents of 2-year-olds will be able to access 15 hours a week of funded childcare support for 38 weeks of the year. To access this support, parents will need to apply for a code via the GOV.UK website. They will also need to check with their childcare provider to see if this is

something they're offering, as not all providers are. Applications are now open, and parents are being encouraged to apply now, and before the 29 February, as applying beyond that date could result in the code not being received in time. Find out more at www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/workingfamilies

For the 10th consecutive year, residents in Oxfordshire are the best in England for recycling, reusing, and composting. Councillor Pete Sudbury, Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Climate Change and Environment, said: "We want to say congratulations and thank you to our residents for all their hard work and commitment in making

it 10 in a row. It is guite an achievement.

"We have successfully kept our waste per household down, and the biggest area for improvement would be food waste. A lot of that is still not being recycled. Wasting less food is good for our wallets and for the planet, and the food waste we do recycle is anaerobically digested, making methane to replace fossil gas to heat our homes and cook our food.

The total amount of household waste produced in Oxfordshire was 278,857 tonnes for 2022/23, with 159,732 tonnes being reused, recycled and composted.
