

#### And is it true?

I have to tell you that I remember very little of any of the sermons I hear. I remember even less of my own. There is, however, an exception to this general rule, involving a brief homily preached many years ago by the then Bishop of Sheffield, Jack Nicholls, on the subject of God becoming man. He told the apparently true story of a group of psychiatric patients in a New York hospital during the early decades of the 20th century. They were quite a problematic group of people, for no matter what steps were taken by the medical authorities certain aspects of their condition seemed to remain untouched by whatever treatment they received. Eventually a young doctor was appointed to the psychiatric department who was determined to solve this mystery and find a cure for these patients. To do so he took the unprecedented step of living his entire life among them; he worked and relaxed among them; he ate his meals with them; he even moved his bed from the doctors' guarters and slept on the ward. He knew that it was only by involving himself entirely in the lives and experience of his patients that he could begin to understand them, and have any hope of finding a cause and cure for their ailments. What the church celebrates at Christmas is God making precisely this decision to take on the trials and temptations of human nature, so that he could number himself entirely with us, flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone, fully understanding what it is like to be you and me, to experience 'the heart-ache and the thousand natural shocks that flesh is heir to.' In Christ, said the bishop, 'God moved his bed on to our ward.' He said it again, and again, his Lancastrian burr adding to the sheer wonder of the proclamation, that the very heart and epicentre of all reality, the ground of our being, and source of all that is, should come among us as a human being. emptying himself in a life of humble service, while raising our flawed humanity to the level of the divine.

I don't know how much this will be on your mind as you're ladling out the sprouts and digging in to the brandy butter, but it is a fairly revolutionary thought that forces us to take human dignity even more seriously than we might already. If it is true, it raises our nature to new heights, and intensifies the need to love our neighbours as ourselves: for when we love and serve them, we love and serve the Christ whose human nature we all share, and in whose divine image we have all been made.

May the joy of this Christmas truth be yours, that (as Betjeman puts it) 'God was man in Palestine, and lives today in bread and wine.' Sounds like the cue for a carol.

Superusers can sometimes fast-track the process by ordering the defect repairs directly with OCC's contractor.

#### Village Hall – 100!

On the village Facebook page a few weeks ago some people were sharing memories of the Village Hall. Going through the hall archive we can see that one of the predecessor charities to the current one running the hall, was established in 1924. This makes it 100 years since the village has had a hall – a facility for recreation for the community.

1924 was the year when the Met Office issued its first broadcast Shipping forecast; it was the year that John Logie Baird sent rudimentary television pictures over a short distance; it was the year that the first broadcast by a monarch was made when George V opened an exhibition and it was a year in which Paris hosted the Olympics.

Much has changed since then in the wider world as well as in the village. This is particularly reflected in the ways in which the community is using the hall. There are more external calls on people's time; more sources of entertainment and an ability for many more people to travel so much further abroad than would have been possible in 1924. Today the hall continues to be used for meetings of village societies, is used for wider community gatherings and events such as the Christmas Bazaar, Bingo and the occasional quiz. Most recently the Village Cinema has been launched. But the usage will continue to change and the committee is looking to the future to ensure that as part of the wider parish community provision - including the sportsfield and the Jubilee Park as well as the pub – the hall continues to provide what the village would like it to provide.

To that end the committee will be exploring ways in which the hall will remain relevant for the next 100 years. Watch this space!

#### **Appleton WI**





#### Preservation – Fruit, Vegetables et al.

My mother was brought up in the Welsh borders within Shropshire and worked from the age of fifteen on family farms owned by relatives. She was orphaned at nine years old.

Later, as a farmer's wife moving to Oxfordshire in 1930, I will always remember her expertise and knowledge of fruit and vegetable preservation – all of which would have been home grown. The dairy on the back of our old farmhouse was packed with shelves of preserves and leads curing hams, sides of bacon etc.

Onions were pickled and popular with cheese for supper; red cabbage – sliced and pickled with cold meats; piccalilli containing cauliflower florets, runner beans, baby onions etc. Apples, pears and plums were bottles or jammed – currants and gooseberries from the garden were made into pies, tarts or jam. Sloes were picked from hedgerows for gin immersion and crab apples made jelly. Nothing was wasted.

A field growing many dandelions was picked and made into delicious wine, and if that was not enough, Shropshire damson plums were sent by train in a barrel to our local village station, and lo and behold! More wine!

On a weekly basis, butter was made, bread was baked with fresh yeast, together with steamed suet puddings for growing children and a hungry farmer.

#### Italian POWs

Referring to the Appleton Advertiser no. 686, I was prompted by the content in Besselsleigh Woods describing the input on a local farmer's farm by Italian prisoners of war.

I am able to add further to this subject as a farmer's daughter in West Oxfordshire in the years 1942-43 when I was about ten years old!


The farm received directions from the then Ministry of Food to plough up a rather large acreage of woodland for extra food production – to our dismay!

A lorry arrived with forty Italian prisoners of war alongside an armed sentry to clear the woodland entirely, which took about three months – at the same time depriving the dairy cattle of much-needed shade in summertime. As a youngster I spent a lot of time with Luigi – the camp cook – who provided fresh coffee in large bowls daily on site to the men. Water was fetched from the farm buildings.

In 1943 Italy surrendered and eventually many prisoners went home, but some stayed, including Luigi, and were spotted again in the Bicester area. I know Luigi enlisted with the British Army, and maybe others did, especially the younger ones?

The field was eventually ploughed up and sown with wheat, thus losing valuable trees, wild flowers and beautiful wild orchids.

#### Appleton History – an Italian Job – Besselsleigh Woods

At the end of WW2 the Italian POWs and Eaton farmhands returned to their homes and families. One – Mr B arrived home - near Rimini on the Adriatic coast; I've kept the full name secure for family reasons. He was reunited with his family – his wife and two children.

But all was not well – he found it almost impossible to make a living as a farmer; he actually longed to return to the life he had led in England and in particular in Eaton. Without much hesitation he wrote to Howard Cornish asking if he could arrange for him to return. This was promptly done and Mr B was soon back in England, followed by his wife and children.

At first they lived in Besselsleigh but then moved to Eaton village. Mr B returned to the farm work he enjoyed; his children went school in Botley – there they had an Italian teacher; their GP was in the surgery at The Plough Inn – as it was until the 1980s.

The family prospered and the son - Mr BJ nr moved from farming to the Morris car plant in Cowley.

My research for this story was a lot more than I usually encountered. I was given a tip off that the Italian family name could be – "B". I heard that the family had settled in Oxford. There were about 20 such entries in the telephone directory and I started to call each one. The first five were met with very cool receptions. On the sixth call I explained, as usual, that I was trying to trace an Italian POW that had settled in Eaton. I was immediately told –

"You're talking about my Father!"

- this was Mr B Jnr. He then went on to explain the family history – as above. He was born in Italy in 1935 and came to England in 1947; he is now aged 89 with an amazing memory of life and events. He has lived a happy and prosperous life in Headington with his wife.
