

Now is the Month of Maying!

Wealands Bell - Rector of Appleton and Besselsleigh

May, as I learned as a pious child, is the month of the Virgin Mary. Statues of the Virgin are crowned in a riot of spring flowers and a fusillade of *Hail Marys*. And while this is not mainstream Anglican behaviour, if you'd been in Appleton any time between the 13th and the 16th centuries, you would have seen processions of the Virgin winding down Long Close or past what would one day be the school or village shop. She was the gentle and maternal power behind the divine throne, after all, and was worth keeping in with.

English Catholics going the extra mile would make their way to Walsingham on the north Norfolk coast (between Cromer and Hunstanton, where there was once, I recall, a rather disappointing joke shop). Here, in 'England's Nazareth', pilgrims could (and still can) visit the supposed replica of the house in which the Holy Family lived in Galilee, venerate the Virgin, and drink the healing waters of the miraculous well.

I tell you all this because, although my own devotion to the Virgin has largely evaporated, it still seems that she has something to teach us post-Enlightenment modern folk about living a fruitful human life.

There are always three things to say.


- Mary's response to the pregnancy-announcing angel ('Let it be to me according to your word') suggests a willingness to co-operate with God's will. Although you may be less clear about what that is, it seems right to avoid a life drowning in selfcentredness by rooting ourselves in what, even if we don't call it God, offers a definite moral compass, preferably one tested by centuries.
- Secondly, although we may not readily entertain notions of a Virgin Mother, we might nevertheless admire, and even imitate, Mary's utter faithfulness and commitment to an ideal which, at the very least, she epitomises. The right sort of single-mindedness absolutely has its place.
- 3. Most interestingly, Mary has a robust social programme, set out in her famous song *Magnificat*, which advocates the casting down of the rich and the raising up of the humble. This kind of revolutionary talk does not always go down well in advanced and affluent liberal democracies, but we would surely be right to be alarmed by the increasingly bold rise of the billionaire, and what begins to look suspiciously like the world's steady tread towards totalitarianism. Keeping an eye out for the health, wellbeing and freedom of those nearer the bottom of the pile is now as much of an imperative as ever.

I'm afraid St Laurence's has no statues for you to crown, but if you fancy popping into church to mutter a *Magnificat* in the coming weeks, especially as we commemorate on May 4th at 10 a.m. the selfless sacrifice of the War that led to widespread peace in Europe, then I for one will be delighted to see you.

Volunteering

Retirement loomed! I did not plan it – it just came at a time in my life when I was doing the work that I loved – dealing with people and planning events. What on earth was I to do next?

Not for me being in the house all day – looking for washing, clearing out drawers needlessly and other household chores! My children had left home – had houses of their own. My husband, already retired, took up two days a week volunteer driving for a local hospice and dearly loved the commitment. I was no longer needed and I began to worry about it.

I aired my situation to a library assistant, who immediately said they could do with a volunteer to collect books for housebound people. I had a car so I thought I would try it. I had three delightful homes to visit and got an idea of the kind of reading the householders liked. BUT I soon found out that the books were a side-line, for all the would-be readers wanted was someone to gossip with! Well – I gave up, as there wasn't enough activity in it for me.

My husband came home one day for lunch and said he had had a word with the V.S.O. (Voluntary Service Organisation) at the Churchill Hospital. Yes – she was setting up a 'help desk' service for patients and would be glad of my help. I went to a meeting and a tour with four others like me and was immediately listed as one of the founders of the Help Desk at the hospital – one day a week, mornings only. I was involved at the start, gradually finding departments and wards and guiding patients to their respective treatment areas. I loved it, and continued for over twenty years. I got to know many lovely people, porters, doctors, nurses etc. and never looked back. I would do it all again if I was mobile!

As I trained as a guide in Oxford and also showed visitors around the college where I worked, I was asked to conduct tours around the Churchill for new staff. So for thirteen years, I took an hour long tour mid-day for new people, researched the work behind various areas and loved it.

A lot of walking of course, but so interesting especially when the new oncology departments were built and incorporated in the visits.

I recommend voluntary work, and there are many avenues to explore whether withing a hospital, school, community garden or just shopping for housebound folk.

It allays boredom and gives a feeling of satisfaction from being wanted again by someone or something. Have a go and look around in your local area and find something that you like to do.

Some of these will be very difficult to photograph - but we know we have some budding photographers out there. The challenge is on! Open to all.

Do you know the difference between our native bluebells and the invasive Spanish variety?

Spanish bluebells (left) have broad leaves, pale blue conical-bell flowers, with spreading and open tips, and flowers are found all around the stem. They have



upright stems, no scent, and coloured pollen inside.

Native bluebells (right) have narrow leaves, deep violet-blue (sometimes white), narrow, tubular-bell flowers, with tips that curl back, flowers on one side of the stem, distinctly drooping stems, a sweet scent, and cream-coloured pollen.

i-Naturalist: Please continue to use this amazing app to record observations of nature. Once you get started, it's very addictive! It's a great way of recording the flora and fauna that's on our doorstep and once your observation has been agreed by an expert, it becomes available for research, which makes it invaluable. We're particularly interested in the items listed above for the photo competition.

Camera Stations: If you are planning a walk, follow the main paths around the woods and look for our 3 Camera Stations. We already have almost one year's worth of photos! There could have been no better 25th birthday present than being awarded the King's Award for Voluntary Service. After 25 years, 150 volunteers and not far short of 100,000 volunteer hours, to be awarded the country's top award for voluntary groups is as good a recognition of all that has been achieved as we could possibly have asked for.

Our history

25 years ago the village shop was closing and the owners wanted to change the building into residential use. A group of determined and hard-working people (with the full support of the village) had other ideas and formed the Community Shop so that this hub – a vital support for so many people – could be launched. The owners of Rowan Cottage (the house attached to the shop building), who were closing the business down, were extremely helpful, giving the shop a year's peppercorn rent so that the business could get up and running under community ownership.

The rest, as they say, is history!

But now, 25 years on, is it time for some change?

From time to time our much-loved village shop benefits from having a thorough review and an overhaul. With the increased popularity of direct-to-door supermarket deliveries, the role of the shop and the range it stocks needs to evolve to keep up with the changing needs of the community.

What products should we be adding to the range? What do our customers want? Are there new services we should be introducing? Who are our customers? Who could become our customers?

This exercise was last undertaken 8 years ago when we introduced decent coffee and home-made cakes, started baking and selling hot pasties, reviewed the product range, gave the shop a lick of paint and a new look, and invested in new chillers and the window seating area. But what's next?!

PART 1 Ducks!

My mother decided that she would like to have some ducks on the farm, as if we did not have enough to look after – with a dairy herd, pigs, two cart-horses, and a small pond, two thousand chickens in houses in several fields plus a good number of eggs every day. So twenty or so white Aylesbury ducks were purchased and took up residence in a shelter in one of our two fruit orchards.

As a ten-year-old I had ambitions of my own, one of which was to build a small pond in the aforesaid orchard! I dug a hole – square in shape, lined it with mortar with a bottle top drainage in the base. I wanted to fill it with tadpoles taken from the redundant sand pits at the edge of the farm. This I duly did, and was pleased with my efforts.

Sadly, the tadpoles disappeared, disintegrated in the pond by a constituent of the mortar – how was I supposed to know? All was not lost, though because the ducks discovered my water hole, and daily, one by one, a duck bathed in my pond! I was so please with the outcome, but my mother was not so, for the ducks made such a mess paddling about in the orchard that it was decided that they had to go! The ducks were quickly despatched and my little watering hole filled in again before someone tripped over it.

So that ambition failed - I had to think of something else!

Let it Grow - in our Community Green-Spaces!

The temptation for many of us can be to regularly mow our greenspaces and keep them looking as neat as possible but research by Plantlife has shown just how beneficial to wildlife the opposite can be. In their 'No Mow May' survey, Plantlife found that the highest production of flowers and nectar sugar was on grass cut once every four weeks. 'Short-grass' plants like daisies and white clover had a chance to flower in between mowing, boosting nectar production tenfold. Areas of grass that were left to grow for even longer periods of time were more diverse in their range of flowers, with other nectar-rich plants like oxeye daisy, field scabious and knapweed providing varied nectar sources well into late summer. At the end, you can take part in a survey by counting the flowers in a square metre of your green space and reporting it to Plantlife.


Appleton Ways


The main road out of and into Appleton from Oxford was via Cumnor and the Thatched Tavern lane - then the Oxford Road. This was put aside with the Enclosure of Appleton in c1830.

The new road was the long straight Eaton Road - about 3/4 of a mile. Some years ago some wag wrote a "history" of Eaton explaining that this was a Roman road used to carry dead soldiers to the Church in Appleton!!

There were two paths/roads from Appleton to Eaton. They arose near the house

Hengrove where they turn left off from the present Eaton Road. The main path turns towards Eaton – the upper path - and arrives at the lower end of the village. The second path – the lower path about 13 yards below leaves the first after just 170 yards and turns sharp left down towards the Hengrove Copse; here it turns in the general direction of Eaton but somewhat to the left. It follows field boundaries old and new and arrives at the Bablock Hythe Road almost 300 yards below the main path.



Did you know?

Badgers live in a complex network of tunnels and chambers called a sett. These can be enormous – ones over 2,000 square metres have been recorded. The tunnels lead to larger chambers used for sleeping and rearing young, which are lined with dry materials such as grass, straw, leaves, or bracken.

Badgers are meticulous in maintaining their setts, regularly cleaning and replacing



bedding to prevent parasite buildup. They may even remove old bedding to air it out on sunny days.

Their setts are passed down through generations and can be centuries old, expanded and maintained over time. They often have multiple entrances, sleeping chambers, and even designated latrines.


Although only one female typically breeds in a clan, the whole group helps protect the young. They groom, play, and cuddle — yes, badger cuddles are a thing. They're also very vocal within their families, using a range of sounds to communicate.
