# Learning to live, living to learn

- in thanksgiving for schools at the start of a new year by the Revd Wealands Bell. Rector

It's a joy to see our youngest villagers making their way willingly back to school each September, hungry to learn in the wonderful environments created by their teachers whom, along with our new Interim Headteacher, Mr Zaheer Ahmed, it is a pleasure to welcome to our community.

There can rarely have been a time when education has mattered more than today, when even the notion of a reliable fact is questioned in our politically volatile, post-truth, Al-generated, media-driven world. What-never-happened quickly erases and replaces what did. (A lie, they say, is half-way round the world while the truth is still putting its shoes on.) So teaching children how to identify and verify the facts, distinguishing between what-really-happened, and what-someone-wants-us-to-believe-happened, has never been more important, especially as we live in a tsunami of facts and false-facts that constantly spew from the portable googling-machines held in every hand, answering our every question, sometimes before we have voiced it.

Of course, we do not want school to be just about facts! That approach was tried and found wanting. 'Facts alone are wanted in life,' claims Mr Gradgrind in Dickens' *Hard Times*. We hadn't got much beyond this view when I was at school, fifty years ago. I have no recollection of ever being asked my opinion about anything at that time, though there were thousands of questions, all about facts: what chemical was this? when did that happen? what was the square on this or that hypotenuse? How many children had Lady Macbeth? My job was to know the answers; having opinions could and should wait until later.

This changed with the GCSE revolution of 1986, when opinion became king. Children whose parents had been required only to learn the poem, or recognise a simile from it, were suddenly required to say what they thought about the poem's imagery; or how successfully they thought the poet had conveyed the idea of love, or death, or daffodils! We were even supposed to ask the children how they felt, a question my own teachers would have found bewildering!

This more holistic approach (acknowledging, though not muddling facts and evidence, thoughts and feelings) is something we should encourage. A pressing problem in our day is our inability to argue dispassionately about facts and opinions. Our tendency is to rush – triggered, hurt and outraged – into our 'identity' groups, agreeing and disagreeing not according to the strength of an argument, but according to whether we suppose ourselves to be somehow similar to the person making it. Learning to separate facts from thoughts and feelings will help our children to 'build wisely for life' and be 'the best they can be for themselves and for others', as our school vision-statement puts it. It will make for clearer thinking and better communication for us all. It might even help to restore our democracy, and improve the quality of our life together.

# School Holidays

Do you remember the school holidays, especially the long summer break that seemed to go on and on for weeks? I do! As a farming family, there were no holidays away from home, but then, these were the pre-war and war-time years so travel was very limited, and severely restricted.

With a milking herd and pigs to feed, and indeed two thousand egg laying hens; plus the difficulty in finding good farm labourers, there was no time for breaks as daily routines fell heavily on the shoulders of the family members! I had some school projects set for the holidays but I did mine in the first few days of breaking up from school, so I could help on the farm.

Thereafter it was daily farm work, feeding pigs and cleaning out their sties, settling the allocations of feed for cows when they came into the cowsheds for milking twice a day, or taking buckets of corn to scatter for the hens at various sites around the farm, collecting the eggs and cleaning them for the packing station.

If we were idle, mother would find us a job to do, so we escaped before she could suggest anything! One farmer's wife was known to say that if her children had nothing to do, the pavement outside the house needed cleaning with toothbrushes!! Imagine that! I wonder if they escaped?

# September News - Rivers & Flooding

**Evenlode Catchment Partnership -** "Restoring the Evenlode catchment for the benefit of all"

The Evenlode Catchment Partnership (ECP) is a dynamic collaboration of over 20 organisations and countless individuals, united by a shared commitment to improving the water environments within the Evenlode catchment which covers the northwest of Oxfordshire. Since our establishment in 2014, the ECP has been dedicated to enhancing water quality, improving flood management, enriching biodiversity, and fostering greater community engagement with our rivers.

Wild Oxfordshire hosts the ECP and leads the natural flood management (NFM), river restoration and wetland creation projects. Changes in land management and river engineering have had a big impact on our wildlife and biodiversity. Natural flood meadow habitat is rare in the Evenlode catchment due to changes to arable farming and past dredging activities, whilst weirs and other barriers block the passage of fish and reduce their access to spawning grounds.

As temperatures rise with climate change in the UK, extreme rainfall days are likely to increase. Recent large-scale flood events in the Cotswolds hit the national head-lines, but behind the scenes the ECP delivered one of the first effective lowland NFM projects, demonstrating that NFM on a landscape scale works! Following Storm Bert (Nov 2024) our NFM interventions prevented flooding for all 12 homes at risk in Milton-under-Wychwood.

# Field corner bunds in action



In 2018, natural flood management measures were installed on a farm above Milton-under-Wychwood to reduce flood risk in the village below. The first photo shows a group of people standing in the bottom of a field bund on 24<sup>th</sup> October 2024.

The second photo shows the same field bund in action on 25<sup>th</sup> November 2024, following Storm Bert. The water is around 2m deep at its maximum and the bund is holding back around 1700m<sup>3</sup> flood water.



On this occasion, the houses along the Littlestock Brook in Milton-under-Wychwood did not flood.

Through regular monitoring of our NFM scheme on the Littlestock Brook, it has been thrilling to learn that not only does this project reduce flooding, but it brings multiple benefits including increased biodiversity.

Landowners can also help by increasing the organic matter in their soil which will increase the capacity of the soil to retain water. Many of the landowners along the floodplain are now reverting their arable fields to grass. This will have multiple benefits including sequestering carbon, reducing erosion of soils and keeping nutrients on farms.

The ECP's work has gained recognition for its impact, with coverage in outlets such as *New Scientist* on our water quality citizen science work. We have used our river restoration and natural flood management projects as models for learning and

best practice. Together, we are making a lasting difference to the health of the Evenlode's rivers and the communities that depend on them.

Our mission is to create a thriving, sustainable water environment that benefits both wildlife and local communities. Find out more by watching our videos and


