In the spitting image of God.

The mists and mellow fruitfulness are back; and the Church thanks God for the harvest once again. All over England, small children go to school armed with tins of tuna fish. More recently, Church practice involves thanksgiving for the whole of Creation at harvest-time: St Francis' feast-day is 4 October and, with his green, animal-loving credentials, it seems good to bind it all together in one great celebration of what we receive on earth.

It is part of the bedrock of Christianity that God is the ultimate source and sustainer of all things. From baby otters to jammy dodgers, God has created everything out of nothing, and 'Behold!', says the Bible, 'it is very good!'

This isn't so much an early piece of consumer-feedback as an important theological reflection: God is good, so the world God made is good. Matter is good. The flesh and bone we are made of are good, and those who are drawn into a pessimism about humanity might think again. You and I, dear Reader, are made 'in the image and likeness of God', insists Genesis 1.27. We may try to disguise the fact, behaving more like brute beasts than angels. But if we are in truth animated with the breath of God (Genesis 2.7), then we should reflect that constantly. We may be particularly intelligent, highly evolved apes. But we are rather more than that besides. For some, God's image and likeness are most clearly visible in our rationality. For others, it's seen in our creativity, or through our wise stewardship of the earth's resources.

Whatever we take our defining characteristic to be, Genesis leaves us with two further ideas. Chapter 1 concludes with the Sabbath, the rest-day that marks God's completion of the perfect creation. Humans are commanded to observe this day, to be drawn further into the life of God, and to experience a foretaste of that eternal rest in God which is our human destiny. (There's more to Churchgoing, you see, than meets the eye.)

The second idea dominates Chapter 2, the finding of a spouse for Adam, 'bone of his bone and flesh of his flesh', someone with whom he can build the great human community to which we also belong, knit together in families and friendship groups, reflecting the divine image corporately as well as individually.

All of which is why the children take tins of tuna for their school's donation to local food-banks. Because all we have is from God, and because, like us, all our neighbours are made in God's image, this time of celebration involves recognising the divine presence in others, whatever their national, economic or legal status. We are God's; they are God's. When we have grasped this harvest-time truth, caring for 'these little ones' as diligently as we can is not only an inviolable obligation, but an indelible joy.

To celebrate **Harvest and Creation Festival**, join us in church on **Sunday**, **5 October**, for a short, über-relaxed, family-friendly service at 10am. Appleton History - Ancient Fields

In 1830 the landscape of Appleton changed dramatically. Before then there were no fenced fields – the land was a wide open space.

This open land was divided into long narrow strips about 6ft wide; each strip was given to a family. Each year the lord of the manor and villagers met to agree who was going to get what – in order to share the land fairly; animals were kept separately in pounds and there was woodland – for timber.



The bulk of the crops grown were wheat or barley interspersed with whatever was in current fashion. Each strip would be carefully maintained by brushing earth away from the edges to the centre; over time the strips became ridges. These ridges can still be seen as "ridge and furrows" in some fields.

In about 1830 the law divided Appleton land into plots held by chosen farmers; this announcement was nailed to the Church door. These new fields had to be enclosed by fences – thus the Appleton we see today.

These fields were often ploughed and over time and the ridges disappeared. There is a very small patch of land in Appleton that still has its ridge and furrows.. I visited it recently but there is no easy public access to it - its boundaries are now very overgrown. The aerial photo of 20 years ago shows the field as it was.

Seasonal Spotlight - Autumn

It's that time of year when the trees will be changing colour, the air is getting colder and fresher, and we can't help thinking of warm drinks, cosy clothes and playing in the crunchy leaves.



As we enter Autumn, it can be tempting to cut back all the dead and dying vegetation in our gardens and green spaces. It's worth considering that many of these woody stems will become perfect winter homes for insects as they enter hiberna-

tion and can create areas of architectural beauty in our homes and communities.

In Oxfordshire, the hedgerow species we generally recommend planting (for their capacity to provide for both people and wildlife year-round) and you're most likely to see in your local area include Blackthorn, Spindle, Common Buckthorn, Guelder Rose, Wild Privet, Cherry Plum, Dog Rose and Hazel. Fruiting season for many of these species starts from late



Riverside trees

The native white, crack, pussy, osier and goat willows are a familiar sight along the Thames and its tributaries. Willows provide shelter for birds, mammals, including bats, otters and water voles. Their leaves are the larval foodplant of the Purple Emperor, Large Tortoiseshell and Comma butterflies and their catkins the earliest sources of food for bees. Both the male and female flowers (catkins) carry sugary nectar, and the male flowers also carry protein rich pollen, which is so important for developing bee larvae. Willow nectar is also a major energy source for Blue Tits during early spring.

Traditionally managed by 'coppicing and 'pollarding', mature trees can be cut to form a thick stump or 'coppice stool' that considerably extends the life of the tree and lets in light to the shrub layer. Some Crack Willow pollards are known to have lived for 1000 years. Willow is also a useful hedge plant in damp conditions.

Trees for Bees

Trees are an important, stable long-term source of food for bees and other pollinators, providing thousands of flower heads all in one place. Plant a variety of tree species selected to benefit bees and other pollinators, with species that flower at different times of the year to provide nectar, pollen and nesting sites as well as offering a haven for other wildlife and cleaning the air and water and storing carbon. Hedgehog -friendly things to do this autumn and winter

Put out a shallow dish of water or make sure your ponds are easy to get out of for hedgehogs (shallow edges or a platform / ramp), so they have water to drink

Leave a wild patch each year with piled up logs or leaves that you don't disturb

Always move your burn piles before you light them as hedgehogs and frogs often use them to sleep in (this is, after-all, how hedgehogs were once upon a time cooked to be eaten!). Thankfully it is now illegal to eat this endangered species

Avoid using pesticides or herbicides as this will make hedgehogs very ill. Find out more here www.hedgehogrescue.org.uk/hedgehog-friendly-slug-pellets/


