BABY, LOOK AT YOU NOW

Few stories have captivated an audience quite as completely as the Christmas stories. Written decades after the events they describe, they should not be read as factual reports from the maternity ward. Rather, St Matthew and St Luke (and only they) weave epic and symbolic stories, laced with references from the Jewish Bible, to explain who Jesus is, and what God means by sending 'his only Son' to be the Saviour of humankind.

People's reaction to the story is especially interesting when it comes to distinguishing between eternal truth and historic accuracy. Some readers get very upset if you suggest that the Nativity story is not a blow-by-blow historic account of what happened in a Bethlehem shed on 'that first Christmas Night.' Others say it is precisely the mythical quality of the stories (a star, angels, a virgin conceiving a child through divine intervention) that convinces them that the whole Christian project is 'a tale told by an idiot, ... signifying nothing.'


Perhaps the safest way through the woods is to abandon the false distinction between truth and myth, which is about as useful as the equally false stand-off between science and religion. The fact is that cultures have always told vast, over-arching stories precisely to tell the truth about themselves; and the fact that such stories are not historically accurate as we would understand the term, does not in any sense limit their truthfulness. A love poem is not deficient, simply because it is not a book about anatomy or psychology.

It was common, in ancient biographies, to assume that the birth of someone who turned out to be great must itself have been noteworthy. It was like saying, *You must have been a beautiful baby coz, baby, look at you now!* Augustus and Alexander had typically miraculous births, while the Buddha was born from his mother's side and, when he took his first steps, lotus-flowers sprang up in his path. So the fact that two of the four gospels give us a magical story about Jesus' birth should not surprise us.

But what might it mean? The birth of God-as-man is a steeple-shaking piece of news, a big deal for heaven as well as earth, and it's not surprising when angels pitch up and start to sing their carols. No-one is to be left out. You can be as poor as a shepherd, or as exotic as a 'wise man' from a far-flung place. There is room for absolutely all of us in this story, and in the loving heart of God. Without exception.

That said, increasingly in Europe we keep Christ at a distance. When he was born among us, we pushed him into an out-house, and we have done our best to keep him there ever since. We know that if we start believing it might all be true, then we'll have to think and act a whole lot differently, and that's a tall order, even with God's promise of abundant new life! It's far easier just to pour another *glühwein*, keep calm, and carry on.

Maybe. But if you find the story getting under your skin more than usual this year, don't panic. Come along and say hello. Bring the grand/kids to the Santa Claus lookalike on Sunday 7th. Or, on Christmas Eve, bring them to the Crib Service; bring your friends to the magical, candle-lit Carols. Details on the back page. I can't promise that Christ won't catch your eye and change your plans, but hey. Why not live a little? And have a very happy Christmas when it comes.



December News – The Importance of Soil Seasonal Spotlight

Winter can be quite a harsh time of year for much of our wildlife, but for some species it can offer a bit of respite from the harsher, colder climates further north. Winter is a fantastic time to see many bird species that we won't see in summer such as redwings and fieldfares. Birds such as starlings start to flock, forming impressive murmurations in the sky. Why not visit your local nature reserve on a winter's day and see what new species you can find?

The Yellow Wagtail Partnership

We wanted to bring a bit of colour to this winter's month by mentioning one of our main projects is the Yellow Wagtail Partnership. The Yellow Wagtail is not a species one would think about at this time of year as by now they will be back in the wintering grounds in sunny West Africa. Wild Oxfordshire have partnered with Earth Trust and Church Farm Partnership and Lower Farm to collectively manage four-miles of wet grassland along the River Thames from Clifton Hampden to Shillingford. The aim of the project is to sustainably manage these grasslands for the benefit of wildlife including the Yellow Wagtail but



also in a way that is economically beneficial for the partnering businesses. However, this project is not just about the Yellow Wagtail, we want to increase the plant and insect diversity and abundance as well. This in turn will increase the amount of food available for many species of bird including House Martins, Swifts, Snipe and Lapwings. Tips for looking after wildlife this winter:

Always move your burn piles before you light them! The best habitat piles are usually created on nature reserves and to the untrained eye, these look a lot like burn piles. The wildlife thinks so too and so many creatures use burn piles to sleep in, including hedgehogs, frogs, voles, and lizards. To avoid burning hibernating wildlife, you must move burn piles before lighting them.

Crack ice on your bird baths, water dishes and ponds so that our winter wildlife can still drink. Who knows which birds you might see enjoying a sip.

Leave area(s) of your garden undisturbed to allow hibernating wildlife to sleep in peace and unharmed. Some invertebrates hibernate in hollow stems of

grassland and scrub species such as cow parsley and other umbellifers. Avoid cutting these as they might be home to sleeping beetles, bees, spiders or even ladybirds.

Log piles are well sought after for both people and wildlife at this time of year. If you can, try to leave a pile outside untouched to allow hedgehogs and other hibernating wildlife to sleep in it over winter.

World Soil Day

The 5th of December **is World Soil Day**, held annually to highlight to importance of healthy soil and its sustainable management. Soil is vital for plant growth and therefore food production. Healthy soils filter and store water, reducing the risk of flooding. Soil can even help mitigate against climate change by storing carbon from the atmosphere. In addition, soil provides a habitat for many different species including bacteria, fungi, worms, invertebrates. It is estimated that a single teaspoon of healthy soil can contain more living organisms than there are people on Earth - that's over 7 billion microbes! We can all do our bit to support healthy soils. This can be in your garden through reducing the amount of chemicals you apply, composting and mulching, or turning your lawn into a meadow. We can also do our bit by supporting farmers who are working to improve their soil quality through sustainable farming practices – when you can, buy organic or directly from the farmer.


