A NEW YEAR FILLED WITH TIME – AND ETERNITY

Mony a mickle maks a muckle! Or so the old saying goes. ‘Look after the pennies, and the pounds will look after themselves.’ But this proverb need not receive a purely financial interpretation. As well as pennies and pounds, it might refer just as helpfully to minutes and hours, days and weeks.

It’s true that our celebration of a New Year helps us concentrate on all those scraps of time which – yes! – this year we really *are* going to gather together and do something useful with: like, read the whole of Dickens; or learn the trumpet; or improve our batting average; or walk to John O’Groats.

But perhaps the focus on a whole year – the rounding out of the 5 as it clicks on to the 6 – is, of itself, a sort of impediment to our profitable use of every minute. We become a bit like birds who suddenly take fright at the vastness of the sky, pulling in their wings (*NO! Don’t look down!*) as they take notice of this particular cubic metre of air; or like fish, quite at home in the mighty ocean, until they begin to gasp for breath in the sudden particularity of this bucketful of water.


Of course we cannot avoid knowing that the year has moved on one, since the last time someone mentioned it. And we are well aware that we have taken another step down the inexorable slipway of Cemetery Road. But a year is such a huge gulp of time to digest in one go, even at the breakneck speeds we like to live at, with our multi-tasking, both-ends-burning connectivity, and with even our intelligence farmed out to (heaven knows why!) machines.

The only wise answer, I’d say, is to go slowly; and go easy on the resolutions: you’ll only feel worse if you take on too much, and then fail. And maybe don’t plan too far in advance: just the time up to lunch perhaps; or between now and the lighting of the evening fire. These are manageable stretches, and can train us in the practice of wisdom.

So instead of going hammer-and-tongs at a thousand new projects; or attempting a complete change of character (after being saddled with the old one for half a century or more); we might calm right down, and try to become conscious of the immense value of each moment, the sheer potential of each new breath we are given. We might learn to fill each paragraph of time with something true or kind or beautiful; and, little by little, as a child learns an instrument by playing scales, we will learn to use our time well – which will sometimes mean doing absolutely nothing!

And through building these little cairns of well-used time, growing pebble-by-pebble into hills and mountains, we learn how to be human. We might even learn something of the business of Almighty God, who, although the divine habitat shuns the ticking of clocks, gives to humankind the medium of time, so that we may learn the secrets of immortality.

We will be like those mediaeval masons who, chip by chip on chiselled stone, spent their whole lives building the churches and cathedrals of a continent. They lived deep in the creativity of each single moment. And in so doing, they raised up the ramparts of eternity.





Bell Ringing

On Saturday 31 January, a visiting band of bellringers will be ringing the bells of St Laurence, Appleton in a long-length peal attempt. This will involve ringing 10075 changes of Stedman Caters. They will be starting to ring at 9.30am and, if successful, will ring continuously for around 6 hours.

Normally peals are about 5000 changes, taking 3 hours to ring, and we allow a few to be rung each year. However, Appleton has a history of long-length peals and some record lengths were rung in the past, which are recorded on peal boards in the church tower. The longest length that has been rung on our bells was 22899 changes of Stedman Caters, in 1978. The most recent long-length peal was on 11 November 2011, when a band including some of our own ringers rang 11111 changes of Stedman Caters. Whilst we will only allow long-length peals very occasionally, we are happy to see this ringing tradition at Appleton continue.

When we next vote it will all look a bit different

For Appleton in 2026 there are no scheduled elections for parish, district, or county council. Barring a general election, it's probably a vote-free year. All the better to get our minds round the changes afoot from 2027.

Appleton has been shifted around like the old clothes in your wardrobe in recent years. In 2024 we were moved out of Oxford West and Abingdon and into Witney for parliamentary elections. Our county councillor is now elected in the Marcham and Cumnor division, which straddles both parliamentary constituencies, and seems remote indeed from Witney, across the river and out west. Previously for county elections we were in the division of Kingston and Cumnor, paradoxically further away from Oxford West and Abingdon than the Marcham and Cumnor division. Our district ward for the Vale is also changing in 2027. Currently our district councillor is elected in Thames ward, which runs from just east of Faringdon up to Appleton. From 2027, if an election is held then, we shall be in Cumnor ward, further east.

So in parliamentary terms our perspective has gone westwards, and in district and county terms further east. The party representing us has not changed as much: Liberal Democrats at parliamentary and district level, and a Conservative at county level. But anyway don't blame the politicians for boundary changes. Those are determined by two boundary commissions. They redistrict on a non-partisan basis. Party politics can come into it occasionally, but it won't have done for the recent changes at local government level in our area.

However, big changes are coming from 2027 onwards. Central government wants to get rid of two-tier local authorities. It plans to replace them with *unitary* authorities, delivering all local-government services for its area from one authority. But this doesn't necessarily mean one 'Oxfordshire' area or one 'Oxfordshire' council. Currently central government is chewing over three possible unitary configurations for the county. One would cover the whole county. A second possibility is to divide the current county into two - north and south - with Oxford City in with the north and the current West Berkshire added to the south, which would be called 'Ridgeway'. A third configuration would see three unitaries; a north, excluding the City; a 'Greater Oxford', covering the City and 46 parishes around it (Appleton included); and Ridgeway in the south.

There are many consequences for the choice central government eventually makes. They affect Appleton as much as all other communities, but whatever happens, after our year's break, who will we be voting for, and when, in 2027?

The answer is unclear. We shall be in a single-member constituency in whatever

unitary configuration is chosen, but we could be in any of the three unitaries. We shall *probably* vote for a so-called shadow council in 2027, which will have a year to prepare the new unitary authority, or authorities, which will go live (presumably without a further election), from 2028. Parliament has to approve, but if it happens it means both the existing county council and the five district councils cease to exist in 2028. One side question to this is whether 2027's scheduled district elections for the Vale will actually take place, or whether the current VOWH council be given an extra year's grace before it disappears?

Finally, how big will the new division Appleton finds itself in actually be? If there's one unitary for the whole county there will probably be about 100 councillors county-wide compared with 69 at present. So the ratio of councillors to voters will be higher than now. We shall be less "represented" in overall terms, of course, because district councillors will no longer exist. If the government instead chooses either two or three unitaries the ratio of councillors to voters will be more favourable than with just a single unitary but still worse than now. But one way or another, under any of the three schemes, we shall have to get used to being part of a different configuration yet again. Only one thing will not change. We shall still have our Parish Council. We elect it again in 2027.



Historical climate change

Have you ever wondered what the fuss was about with climate change, and whether it's really such a big deal? After all, weather changes all the time, doesn't it? Here are some points often raised and a quick summary of our understanding of the science at the moment.

Temperature has fluctuated a lot in the past 2,000 years without any human influence. Today's temperature change is just another of these fluctuations.

Global climate has remained relatively stable over the last 11,000 years, supporting human civilisation's development, until the last 150 years when humans began releasing large quantities of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Today's rapid warming is happening across the globe because human activities are releasing carbon dioxide into the atmosphere at a far greater rate than natural processes.

Can we trust temperature records from thousands of years ago given they cannot be measured directly?

Yes, we can trust these records. Scientists have made robust estimations of past climates using 'proxies,' which are natural archives of past climates, such as ice cores, tree rings, coral skeletons, or sediment layers. These proxies record some physical or chemical property that changes with the climate. There are more than 10,000 proxy studies worldwide, collectively painting a picture of Earth's climate before we had modern temperature records.

Do we need a warmer planet to stop us going into an ice age?

No. The next ice age isn't expected to happen for at least another 50,000 years. The more immediate problem is limiting the worst impacts of human-caused climate change. This is already costing lives around the globe through extreme weather events.

It was warmer in the past so today's climate change is nothing to worry about.

The Earth is currently warming abnormally quickly due to human-released carbon dioxide. Current climate change is particularly dangerous because modern animals and plants (including humans) have not experienced changes of this scale and speed before, making it challenging for us (and the biodiversity we rely on) to adapt.
